Sustainability 2010: The Cultural Dimension

Background and Aim

The workshop concentrates on problems of relationships between sustainable development and culture. Step by step, the cultural perspective is becoming an aspect in the debates on sustainable development. This workshop intends to provide a sound scientific contribution to that debate by opening up the subject of cultural sustainability in an interdisciplinary way without hasty restrictions or exclusions. Based on this principle, the subject is discussed in the conflicting fields of cultural heritage, globalization and technological change. At the same time, such an emerging topic also requires a detailed methodological discussion which finally aims at an adequate specification of the subject.

For this workshop answers to the following three questions are central. Please answer them out of your cultural and disciplinary background:

- How do you interprete sustainable development?
- Where are the shared topics of sustainable development and culture (independent of the unterstandig you give to "culture")?
- What are the efforts to promote sustainable development and what sorts of difficulties you are identify?

This workshop will be realized in the framework of the Sustainable Technological Development Forum, established in 2002. There has been a workshop with changing topics each second year in Europe (BME/Budapest) and the USA (Florida Tech/Melbourne/Florida).
